
Shop Local This Holiday Season

The Poinsettia Christmas Star

The poinsettia is a holiday favorite, indigenous to Mexico and Central America. The colored leaves at the top of the plant, called bracts, are often confused as the flower of the plant. The flowers are much smaller and hardly noticeable.



They are most often red, but they can also be orange, light green, pink, cream, white or marbled. The color is created through a process called photoperiodism, which requires alternating between 12 hours of darkness and 12 hours of full sunlight for five consecutive days to achieve the bright colors they are known for.

While the sap and latex of the plant contain chemicals that are mildly toxic, it would be necessary to ingest over 500 bracts to have any serious effect on a 50 pound child, according to the Center for Poison Control. The plants do have a more severe effect on animals, especially cats, and should be kept in a safe place away from pets.

Canada Goose Branta canadensis



The Canada goose is a wild goose native to temperate regions of North America, occasionally found in northern Europe and New Zealand. Also referred to as the Canadian goose, it has seven subspecies of varying size and plumage. The males usually weigh between 7 - 14 lbs, females are virtually identical but slightly smaller at 5 - 12 lbs, and have a different honk. Their wingspan ranges from 50 - 73 inches in length.

The Canada goose is a migratory creature of habit, overwintering in the south and breeding during spring in the north. However, due to an abundance of safe, man-made bodies of water and easier food sources, these geese have become permanent residents in urban areas as far south as Florida. This change in their behavior has led to overpopulation in some areas, where they are considered pests due to their droppings, noise and abrasive disposition. Canada geese, and other migratory birds, fly in a V formation

to conserve energy on long flights. The lead bird "breaks the wind", reducing the resistance for the other birds. When this bird tires it falls back and another takes its place; in this way they rotate positions in the formation. This flight pattern also helps the birds "keep an eye on each other."

Train of Hope for the Holidays



The Train of Hope is planning its next cross country trip to bring more relief items to the victims of hurricane Sandy in New Jersey. Their last trip at the beginning of the month was an enormous success, filling an entire baggage car donated by Amtrak for the relief effort.

This time around, Train of Hope co-founder Donna O'Daniels has issued a challenge to everyone throughout the US to participate in these relief efforts. The objective is to receive donations from all fifty states for the shipment leaving via Amtrak Crescent Route on December 14th. Butternut Squash and Radish Stir

Ingredients:

- 1 medium butternut squash, de-seeded and sliced
- 1 daikon or a small bundle of amethyst radish, sliced
- 1/2 a small white onion, diced
- 2 tomatoes, cubed

2 or 3 toes or garlic, minced radish greens from daikon, shredded dried oregano, parsley and tarragon cavenne pepper and salt

You will also need:

1 cup of rice, cooked

Cooking Instructions:

This is a really easy recipe, most of the work is in the prepping. Take a deep skillet and add about a 1/4 inch of water. Cook down your onion, garlic, herbs and spices in this for a few minutes on medium heat. Add the butternut squash, diakon and tomatoes and cover - cook until fork-tender, or as you prefer. Turn off the heat, add the radish green and stir in until steamed. Serve over rice or mixed in.







Rosemary

Rosemary is a member of the mint family native to the mediterranean region. It's fragrant needle-like leaves are well known in the culinary world as a flavoring for roast meats. This is due in part to its use as a food preservative, especially in foods high in omega 3 oils, like salmon or other fish.



Rosemary has a long history of medicinal use. It is believed to improve memory, relieve muscle pain and spasms, stimulate hair growth and support the circulatory and nervous system.

Laboratory research indicates that rosemary has antioxidant properties. These antioxidants can neutralize free radicals in the brain, preventing and possibly reversing cell damage. Rosemary oil has antibacterial properties, and a compound present in rosemary called carnosol has inhibited cancer growth in studies conducted with animals.

Historically, rosemary is considered a symbol of remembrance as well as a "love charm".





The Holiday Blend Tea is a classic blend of citrus peel with spices of cinnamon, ginger and nutmeg. It is delicious hot or iced, and it is excellent served with your favorite Holiday meal. Garnish with Farmer's Market citrus (satsumas are in season!)


