#### Wildlife Lookout: Fox Squirrel



The Fox Squirrel can grow to 28" from head to tail. In the South, it is generally grayish or grizzled with a dark head, white nose and ears. Heavybodied with a squarish face, the Fox Squirrel can be found in oak groves and close to longleaf pines in open forest stands. They may also be found on the borders of cypress swamps, as well as urban areas. The Fox Squirrel has two types of shelters: leaf nests and tree dens. They often use natural tree cavities or holes created by birds. Favorite foods include tree buds, insects, tubers, bulbs, roots, bird eggs, and the seeds of pines and spring fruiting trees. They are vocal with an assortment of "chucking" and "clucking" sounds.

## **Gardening Tips**

#### Planting a Hanging Basket

Most wire-framed hanging baskets are sold with a moss lining which is essential for moisture retention. Equal parts peat-based and loam-based compost makes an ideal soil mixture for a hanging basket. Fill the bottom of the basket with 2 inches soil and firm down; cut 2 inch slits along side in accordance with the plants space requirements. Insert trailing plants in slits roots first with plant hanging down. When outside of hanging basket is full plant a dominant plant, such as a cascading fuchsia, in the center. Position a few more plants on top around the center plant, setting at an angle facing outwards. Fill basket firmly with compost to 1/2 inch below the rim and finish with a thin layer of moss over the top. Water basket thoroughly.

## Farmer's Market Recipes

Fresh recipes inspired by ingredients found at the Covington Farmer's Market, by Chef Sorelli

#### Spring Onion Grilled Chicken Salad Collect:



1 Whole Chicken (G F Farms James Shoop) 1 6 oz Jar of Green Onion Oil (Sorelli's At the Market) 2-3 heads of Lettuce (Grow Farms)

> 1 Container of Sundried Tomato Feta Torte (Jeanie Simmons)

1 Container of Honey Mustard (Dolese Italian Stuffed Artichokes)

1 Bag of Garden Crackers (Living Foods)

Marinate the chicken to prepare for grilling. You can cut the chicken in half and debone if you prefer, but it is delicious either way. After the chicken is split in half, lay in a flat deep dish and cover with the green onion oil (reserve a small amount to finish the cooked chicken with). Add salt and pepper. Set in fridge and let marinate until it is time to grill. While the chicken is marinating, we can clean the greens for the salad. Grill the chic<mark>ken until it has reached an</mark> internal temperature of 165 degrees and glaze with remainder of oil. Now we can put together the salad. Put the lettuce in a nice size bowl and crumble in the feta torte. Next add the honey mustard in an amount suitable to your liking and mix together. Plate the salad and crumble the garden crackers on top. Slice the grilled chicken to serve with salad.







#### **Pet Care:**

#### The Importance of Fresh Water

As we move into the Spring and Summer months, the importance of fresh water for your pet is critical. Dogs and cats do not have sweat glands, and their heat exchange is through the process of panting. They should always have access to fresh water that is changed at least twice a day, in a small bowl or dish.

Standing water that is not changed often should be eliminated, because that is a ground breeding for mosquitoes. Heartworms are directly associated with mosquitoes and can be a serious threat for dogs in this climate.

Providing fresh water for your pet is essential for hydration and basic health, especially in the warmer months. Eliminate any standing water in your pet's vicinity, if possible. Consult your veterinarian if your pet seems to be consuming too much water, or if your pet is not interested in drinking at all. The St. Tammany Humane Society offers a low-cost vet clinic on premises.
