Wildlife Lookout: The Brown Pelican

The only non-white pelican in the world, the Louisiana State bird has appealed to the hearts of bird lovers everywhere. Admirers watch in awe of the birds dramatic hunt - plunging into the surf up to 30 feet with it's wings half folded after small fish. In a successful hunt the pelican takes both water and fish into its pouched bill, then strains out the water before throwing its head back to swallow the fish. A mature Brown Pelican has a mostly gray body, a long white neck which adorns a brown strip along the back during breeding season (summer), and a yellow crest. Immature birds are mostly

white with defined brown wings and head. The Brown Pelican prefers salt waters and can often be seen perched majestically on fishing piers. Pelicans have a powerful stroking flight alternating with short glides, often only inches above the water. The birds travel and nest in small flocks, seen flying high above in long lines. Pelecanus occidentalis


# **Covington Time Bank**

### **Farmer's Market Recipes**

Fresh recipes inspired by ingredients found at the Covington Farmer's Market, by Chef Sorelli

# Summer Squash Soup with a Tomato Relish Collect:

4 pounds squash (mix it up - many vendors have different types of squash)

2 pounds of mixed tomato (Father and Son Farms)

- 1 small jar of Orange Oil (Nucio's) 2 tablespoons of chopped garlic
- 1 onion chopped
- 4 cups veggie stock or water

Dice the tomatoes in small pieces and add the one of the tablespoons of garlic to it. Salt and pepper to taste, add one cup of your orange oil and set in the refrigerator to marinate.

# Soup:

**Relish:** 

Begin by chopping and de-seeding your squash. In a 4-6 quart pot, sear the onion and remaining garlic; cook down until onions are translucent. Lower the heat, add the chopped squash and cook till tender, salt and pepper to taste. Next add the stock or water, allow to boil for about twenty minutes. Next, take your pot off the stove and let it cool for about fifteen minutes, or until manageable. Puree this mixture in a food processor or blender until soup has a smooth consistency, and then return to the pot to be warmed back up. Taste for salt and pepper and serve with tomato relish drizzled on top.

The Covington Farmer's Market is every Saturday from 8-12 at the 600 block of Columbia Street, and every Wednesday at the Covington Trailhead from 10 - 2, rain or shine.

# Northshore Food Co-op Begins Feasibility Study

The first NSFC meeting was a success, with an incredible turnout of individuals both excited and intrigued. Farmers, producers and consumers alike were all in attendance. Columbia Street Natural Foods provided drinks and sandwiches, Tim and Chelsea made a delicious cabbage salad and Leslie Guy of Sorelli's at the Market brought homemade jambalaya. Jodie Burke led a presentation that thoroughly broke down the steps in creating a co-op, followed by much discussion. It was determined that a feasibility study is needed in order to proceed with creating a business plan for the co-op. This study will include community projects to educate the public on the benefits of a Food Co-op and the necessity of fresh produce. The formation of a committee to oversee the study is underway. ### **Public Hearing Notice - Increased Millage Rates**

Notice is hereby given pursuant to Article 7, Section 23(C) of the Constitution and R.S. 47:1705(B) that a public hearing of the Covington City Council in St. Tammany Parish will be held at its regular meeting place at 222 East Kirkland Street, Covington, LA, on Tuesday, July 17, 2012 at 5:00 P.M. to consider levying addition or increased millage rates without further voter approval or adopting the adjusted millage rates after reassessment and rolling forward to rates not to exceed the prior year's maximum. The estimated amount of tax revenues to be collected in the next tax year from the increased millage is \$1,093,293.00, and the amount of increase in taxes attributable to the millage increase is \$5,466.00.


