and Gail Hood. Gallery hours are Thursday through Saturday, noon to 5 pm, or by appointment. (985)-892-4148.


15th Annual Swing In The Pines Saturday, May 11

Edible Flowers Pasta Recipe from Slice of Heaven Farm

Ingredients

spaghetti (1/2 pound, boiled)

- 1 Tbsp olive oil
- 1 Tbsp butter

half a leek, cut into thin medallions

one shallot, diced

4 cloves of garlic, diced

2 handfuls of edible brassica blossoms, thick stems removed salt and pepper

a dash of white wine

1/2 cup of grated parmesan

Directions

Heat the olive oil in a large pan and sautee the leeks and shallots for about 3 minutes. Add the garlic and edible blossoms. Toss around for a minute in the pan then add a splash of white wine and some salt



and pepper. Let the wine reduce for a minute or so. Melt the butter in the pan and immediately add your cooked spaghetti noodles. Toss the sauce around the noodles to coat. Mix in the parmesan and serve hot. Slice of Heaven Farm is a family-

KCB Announces Historic Tree Hunt Results

As part of Covington's 2013 Bicentennial Celebration, Keep Covington Beautiful sponsored a "Historic Tree Hunt" this spring. The goals of the project were to find Covington's largest and oldest trees of any species and to discover both historical and anecdotal information about the city's oldest residents; its heritage trees. Trunk circumference was used to determine the largest live oaks, the same standard used by The Louisiana Forestry Association for their champion tree list.

Live Oaks: Largest outside city limits: 26' LaJuana Huhn, Country Club Estates

Largest inside city limits: 23' 7" Private Residence

Due to difficulty in determining age of trees (LOS standard of 16' for 100 years of age) **Most Historic Trees** (rather than oldest)

Roger Salter: 6 oaks at Rutland and New Hampshire on site of Covington's first bank, appear in image of Old Bank

Hotel built in 1834; trees & garden appear in 1850's hotel ad

Live Oak outside city limits

Fay Hill, Sunnybrook Oaks: Andrew Jackson camped under these trees during trip to Battle of New Orleans 1812-1814. Two spies said to have been hanged from one of them.

Most Historic Tree inside city limits

Bald Cypress at Chimes Restaurant: Site of first parish courthouse and jail built in 1818, later a private residence, a Catholic seminary and the Claiborne Cottage resort, opened in 1880.

Most Interesting Personal Story

"Gleason Oak", Tyler and Columbia, Annie & Buddy Spell: Dedicated to James Gleason for his years of service to the community and as a friend and teacher in matters of law and life.

Citizens are encouraged to plant young trees to replace the city's aging, iconic Live Oaks, as well as pines, cypress, magnolia and other species to add to the community forest. Although the contest portion of the tree hunt has ended, KCB would like to continue adding trees of all species to this data base. 

Tanning Anyone?

Many of you may be aware that there exists three types of rays emitted by the sun. These are UVA, UVB and UVC. UVC rays are absorbed by the ozone layer and never reach the earth. Both UVA and UVB penetrate the atmosphere and play a vital role in premature aging of the skin, eye damage such as cataracts, and skin cancers. These rays also suppress the immune system and reduce one's

It was once believed the UVB, longer rays, caused most of the skin cancers. Although these rays cause reddening and sunburn, they tend to damage the skin's superficial layers and the development of skin cancer. Research findings have revealed that UVA rays, shorter rays, penetrate deeper and damage skin cells deep in the basal layers of the skin where most of the skin cancers occur. UVA is the dominant tanning ray. This applies to both indoor and outdoor tanning. A tan results from injury to the skin's DNA. The skin darkens in an imperfect attempt to prevent further DNA damage. These mutations can lead to skin cancer.

Tanning booths emit UVA in doses as much as 12 times that of the sun. People who use tanning salons are 2.5 times more likely to develop squamous cell cancers and 1.5 times more likely to develop basal cell cancers. According to recent research, first exposure to tanning beds in youths s melanoma risk by 75%. Every year 2.3 million teens visit tanning salons. The World Health Organization notes that those who use tanning beds have a 15% higher risk of developing melanoma. Those who use tanning beds before age 35 increase the risk by 75%. Melanoma kills more than 8,000 people a year! According to the International Journal of Cancer, tanning beds do not offer any health benefits and they do not prevent sunburn. Many of you may have read my post on Facebook about the 17 year old who visited me in the dermatology clinic seeking treatment for acne. During a skin exam, I observed a dark mole behind her left knee. The biopsy findings revealed melanoma. She had been using the tanning bed since she was 12 years old. So please think before you take that leap into the tanning
